SOCIAL ENTERPRISE SCOTLAND/SCHW/CH EX: COMMUNITY WELLBEING EXCHANGE	17 November	Funding up to £1,000 is available for community groups and voluntary organisations to purchase activities and services supplied by social enterprises and third sector organisations to improve the mental health and wellbeing of people in their local community.
OFGEM ENERGY INDUSTRY VOLUNTARY REDRESS SCHEME (ENERGY REDRESS SCHEME)	14 November	The Ofgem Energy Industry Voluntary Redress Scheme (Energy Redress Scheme) opens on 24 October 2023 for its sixth funding round. A total of £14 million is available for charities and community energy groups – including community interest companies, co-operative societies and community benefit societies – to apply for grants through four funding streams.

	Projects will be considered that focus on supporting households most at risk from cold homes and high energy bills, the development of innovative products and services related to domestic energy use, or carbon emissions reduction projects, across England, Scotland and Wales.
	The funding streams available are:
	The Main Fund , containing £9.3 million – aimed at projects seeking grants between £50,000 and £1 million that will support households in vulnerable situations.
	The Small Project Fund , containing £500,000 – aimed at projects seeking grants between £20,000 and £49,999 that will support households in vulnerable situations.
	The Innovation Fund , containing £2.1 million – aimed at projects that will develop innovative products or services to benefit households. Applicants can apply for grants between £20,000 and £500,000.
	The Carbon Emissions Reduction Fund , containing £2.1 million – aimed at projects that will reduce UK carbon emissions and empower households to reduce their carbon footprint. Applicants can apply for grants between £20,000 and £500,000.
	Before applying, organisations need to pre-register by visiting the Energy Redress registration page.

The fund aims to support community organisations to reduce their building energy costs and carbon emissions. The Let's Do Net Zero Community Buildings Fund is open now and is planned to run until the end of March 2025, subject to funding availability. Funding is available for many types of community building, including: community cafes, community hubs, faith buildings, public halls, community halls and centres. Grant funding is available for up to 80% of eligible costs up to a maximum of £80,000. New guidance now available.

CHARLES HAYWARD FOUNDATION - OLDER PEOPLE - SMALL GRANTS	n/a	Funds preventative and early intervention programmes being delivered at the community level which allow older people to stay in their own homes and remain independent. They are particularly interested in programmes which show some creativity in improving the quality of life of older people. Up to £7,000.
CIRCULAR ECONOMY INVESTMENT FUND	N/A	This fund, administered by Zero Waste Scotland, offers investment to SMEs based in Scotland for work that will help to deliver circular economy growth.
CIRCULAR TEXTILES FUND		This fund supports the development of circular supply chains across the textiles industry in Scotland to help businesses achieve net zero carbon emissions. Zero Waste Scotland is administering the fund, which is backed by the Scottish Government, to help reduce the environmental impact of textiles.
CLIMATE ENGAGEMENT LAB – 2023 OPEN CALL FOR INNOVATION PARTNERSHIP		Climate Outreach is looking for a new innovation partner organisation to reach and motivate specific audiences in the UK. The <u>Climate Engagement Lab</u> is looking to support an existing project that is engaging people who are concerned about politics and climate change, but aren't generally part of the climate conversation and are deeply and instinctively distrustful that 'elites' will do much to help. Through the

		partnership, they will provide free support for a group that's engaging working class communities on climate or climate-adjacent (i.e. transport, energy, food) projects. The chosen partner will get support to apply evidence-backed insights to their project, along with up to £3,000 to cover the costs of participation.
COMMUNITY RIGHT TO BUY FUND		The Community Right to Buy Fund provides financial support for community organisations in the Highlands and Islands of Scotland. The fund helps communities pay for professional services to help them register an interest in land or buildings under the Community Right to Buy legislation. These services could include legal title searches or help with mapping. Funding of up to £5,000 is available, to cover up to 80% of the eligible cost. Communities must be prepared to cover the rest of the cost from other sources. This support is unlikely to involve state subsidy, but this will be assessed on a case by case basis.
CONNECTING SCOTLAND SUPPORT FOR DEVICE LENDING LIBRARIES (SUMMER/ AUTUMN 2023)	extended to 27 November 2023	The objective of this project is to provide devices and/or connectivity to organisations across Scotland that can be used as part of lending schemes or lending libraries to support people who are experiencing digital exclusion. The Connecting Scotland device lending libraries programme is open to organisations that are already running device lending libraries. It can help them expand the range of devices and connectivity that they have available, extend the number of devices available for loan or replace devices that are coming to the end of their lives.
CONNECTING SCOTLAND - SUPPORT FOR HOUSING PROVIDERS	extended to 27 November 2023	Connecting Scotland is a collaboration between Scottish Government and SCVO to increase digital inclusion. The objective of this project is to provide devices and/or connectivity to organisations across Scotland providing social housing or transitional accommodation. There are three opportunities within this fund for devices and/or connectivity to support people who are experiencing digital exclusion: • To form a new lending library • To be part of a community space where devices and connectivity are available • A larger improvement project for connectivity infrastructure in communal areas This project is for social housing providers and voluntary and public sector organisations providing short- or longer-term transitional housing services. They are looking to fund organisations who are less experienced in digital inclusion work but who have the resource and supporting infrastructure in place to manage new projects. Assessment of applications will be done on a rolling basis with awards made until funds are exhausted.

CORRA FOUNDATION - BOOST SMALL GRANTS		Boost small grants programme is for organisations supporting children and families in their local communities. It has been created to help groups that find the increases in basic running costs (for example utilities, salaries, transport) are making their work much more challenging. Boost will provide grants of £500-£3,000 to grassroots organisations and charities with a yearly income of up to £50,000 whose work benefits children and families. This fund aims to ensure accessible, supportive community-led activities remain available to children and families despite the challenges the cost of living poses for charities and community groups. Boost is delivered by Corra Foundation and is a partnership between the STV Children's Appeal and Corra Foundation.
CORRA FOUNDATION - NATIONAL DRUGS MISSION	Various, plus 28 November 2023	Corra Foundation is administering funding to support the National Drugs Mission on behalf of The Scottish Government. Three funds are now open to applications from organisations working across a range of approaches. This includes improving access to residential rehabilitation and treatment, support for frontline community services and smaller community groups supporting people and families. Corra Foundation is supporting the administration of three funds: Improvement Fund. Funding for drug service resources with a particular focus on residential rehabilitation and associated services. Micro grants. Funding for organisations with income under £50,000 supporting people and families with experience of drug use or recovery. Local Support Fund. Funding for organisations with income under £500,000 supporting people and families with experience of drug use or recovery.
CREATIVE SCOTLAND - MADE IN SCOTLAND ONWARD INTERNATIONAL TOURING FUND	Remains open until it is fully allocated	The aim of the Onward International Touring Fund is to enable artists, bands and ensembles based in Scotland to take up new international touring opportunities for work programmed as a direct result of the inviting promoter seeing the work at the Edinburgh Festival Fringe. This fund exists to support costs linked to flights, freight, visas and the translation of marketing materials. Other costs are expected to be met by the inviting promoter.
- MADE IN SCOTLAND SHOWCASE	12 noon on 22 November 2023 for decisions mid- February 2024	The purpose of the Made in Scotland Programme is to raise the international profile of Scottish artists through the promotion of Scottish work at the Edinburgh Festival Fringe. Funding is available to help support the presentation at the Fringe of new or existing artistically ambitious work with strong onward potential as part of the Made in Scotland Showcase. All applicants should be considering their international ambitions for the show being presented. Applications can come from individual artists, companies, organisations, promoters, record labels and venues. All applicants must be based in Scotland. Student and non-professional companies are not eligible to apply.

		Those selected to be part of Made in Scotland will also receive support and advice to help them prepare for participation in the programme, including advice on marketing, venues, networking and much more.
CREATIVE SCOTLAND: FUTURE FUNDING FRAMEWORK		If you are a voluntary organisation delivering arts, creative and cultural activities, check the updated planning timetable for multi-year funding published this week by Creative Scotland. Their Open Fund also relaunches in October. Information sessions to follow.
	The fund is open all year round – with no deadlines	Grants up to £100,000 over one year are available for charities, organisations and groups involved in the arts, screen and creative industries to adapt, respond and sustain practice. The fund will continue to support organisations to deliver a wide range of creative activity. This includes funding for: • a specific one-off project or production or • a period of creative research and development or • a longer term programme of work. It can also support organisations to undertake business and organisational development that will: • enhance their business sustainability through the development of new or more diverse income streams or • consider broader organisational development costs. Eligible organisations can apply for funding between £1k and £100k for projects or programmes lasting up to 18 months. If you are seeking more than £100k and 18 months support refer to the National Lottery
CULTURE & BUSINESS FUND SCOTLAND (C&BS FUND)	Opens 24 May	Extended Programme Fund (deadline: 14 November 2023). The C&BS Fund provides match funding to culture organisations to enable partnerships and collaborations with businesses by incentivising sponsorships to bring diverse creative projects to life. Through ongoing support from Scottish Government, in 2023, the C&BS Fund will provide match funding of up to 14,000 pounds per organisation, with the intention to support as many arts and heritage organisations as possible, from grassroots initiatives to established cultural events. Other priorities for the C&BS Fund this year will be to support organisations who have implemented Fair Work policies, have introduced carbon neutral plans or policies and have embedded equality, diversity and inclusion in all aspects of the activities for which they seek funding through the C&BS Fund

CYCLING SCOTLAND: CYCLING FRIENDLY GRANTS	-	Grants up to £20,000 are available for community groups and voluntary organisations for local projects that will improve cycling facilities and increase the number of people cycling. Other funding programmes are available.
CYCLING TOURISM FACILITIES FUND (HIGHLANDS AND ISLANDS ENTERPRISE) MOVE YOUR CYCLING FACILITIES UP A GEAR		This fund is for businesses and community enterprises operating in the tourism sector to develop and enhance their cycle tourism facilities. The minimum grant is £5,000 up to a maximum of £25,000 for capital expenditure, which will cover up to 50% of total eligible project costs. Funding can be used towards a variety of capital projects including investing in fixtures, fittings, construction, adaptation, or upgrade of premises to improve cycling tourism facilities. Funded activity must take place between 28th August and 14th February 2024. Grants of up to £300.00 are available

	on a rolling basis during the fund period and must be used to support conversations, events or gatherings in person or online. Following a highly inclusive process of engagement with communities in 2018, the Democracy Matters Fund has developed into phase two. Phase one showed that different places and diverse communities work best when they have local control and influence over decisions that affect them most. This fund aims to develop the thinking around how a vibrant, equal system of local democracy, where people understand their rights and actively participate in civic life, can be made to work in practice. The Fund will: • Support organisations and groups to host conversations and gather the views of people across Scotland on how we can create a system of inclusive local democracy; • Reach out to all communities across Scotland no matter how small, large or what their geographical influences are; • Reach out to marginalised individuals and communities whose voices are not heard. DEVELOPMENT GRANT FUNDING FOR BUSINESSES AND THIRD SECTOR ORGANISATIONS	The Shetland Islands Council Economic Development Grant Scheme provides grants of up to £25,000 to businesses and third sector organisations in Shetland. It aims to help organisations with the costs related to developing growth or research projects.
DISTRICT HEATING LOAN FUND	The District Heating Loan Fund provides capital loan funding of more than £1 million to organisations in Scotland that use renewables technologies to build out heat networks.
